This event will address the potential as well as the inherent risks of the use of artificial intelligence systems as relates to Personal Data going from the collection and (incoming data) to the use, processing and output of such Data (outgoing data).

Firstly, we will focus on incoming data —that is, data collected from individuals or other sources such as companies— and discuss the implications for judges as regards open data policies and pseudonymisation of court decisions amongst other things. Secondly, we will turn to outgoing data— the results of data processing.

Here, we will also explore how the use of outgoing data, particularly in the context of automated decision-making, impacts individuals' rights. We will finally dive into real cases scenarios to get better insights into litigation strategies.

By examining both the incoming and outgoing data, this seminar aims to provide valuable

perspectives into the complexities of data protection in the context of AI.
